

Key considerations guiding the E+ pilots

Flexibility and proportionality

The criteria were drafted to be flexible and to accommodate many possible ways for universities to prove compliance with them.

Academic freedom

The criteria were drafted to **respect academic freedom**and to leave up to universities to decide what and how to teach.

They don't impose the use of pedagogies or topics in curricula.


Alignment with Bologna

All Bologna tools are integrated in the criteria.

This ensures full compatibility and complementarity.



Award process and actors



- All E+ pilots agreed that the process should be integrated into existing accreditation and/or quality assurance processes (without replacing them).
- Compliance with the criteria could be verified by an **EQAR-registered agency** during the accreditation or evaluation of a joint programme.
- Self-accrediting institutions could verify such compliance themselves once the process would be checked by an EQAR registered agency.
- The process could be similar for both a European degree and a European label, and both could coexist. However, only a European degree would directly bring simplification.

The proposal for a Council recommendation proposes that MS could allow their QA agencies and/or higher education institutions (depending on the approach to external QA) to verify compliance with the criteria **for the award of a label**
